A Message from our President

Dear association members and friends,

As I reach the end of my term as president, I want to thank you for your continued support for the Phi Beta Kappa Alumni Association of Greater Austin. It has been a productive and interesting year.

On April 10 we gathered at Antone's to hear a jazz quartet from the University of Texas Butler School of Music, and to enjoy seeing fellow PBK members from the Austin Area. Thanks to carryover Key Connection grant funds from national Phi Beta Kappa, admission was free.

At the May meeting, continuing the collaboration with Breakthrough Central Texas, the scholarship committee awarded scholarships to seven high school seniors who will be the first in their family to attend college. We also awarded the Phillip F. Patman Memorial Scholarship to a student

at Texas State University. We were able to award so many scholarships because of the generous contributions of members like you.

Also at the May meeting, Steve Saltwick, co-founder of Braver Angels of Central Texas, spoke on the topic of "Your Brain and the Solution for Political Polarization – the Neuroscience of Braver Angels." He focused on what can be done about the state of political interaction in America. He advised that we should live the motto of Phi Beta Kappa to expand the use of a unique human part of our brain.

On September 25th, the association sponsored a second Key Connections event with financial support from the national organization. A jazz ensemble from the University of Texas provided music at the home of Don and Sharon Flournoy. Current association members along with new PBK members in the Austin area enjoyed snacks and libations.

On November 13th, Dr. Daniel Jaffe, the Jane and Roland Blumberg Professor of Astronomy at the University of Texas, spoke at the fall general meeting. His talk was entitled "First Galaxies, New Planets: The Revolution in Astronomy." We also presented the 2022 Teaching Excellence award at this meeting.

The association participated in Giving Tuesday on November 29, 2022 for the third year in a row. The 2022 effort raised more than \$12,000 in donations and pledges. These funds will support our high school scholarship program for Breakthrough Central Texas students in 2023. Many thanks to those who donated to this worthy cause.

At the end of 2022, the association has 133 members (including 29 life members) plus 22 complimentary student members for a total of 155 members. In early January we will be asking current members to renew for 2023 and reaching out to thousands of potential members in the greater Austin area. Here's hoping our membership increases in the new year.
